



#### **Fishing Conditions**

Smallmouth are being caught on the main lake on points and pockets. The best baits are jigs, shaky heads, crankbaits, spoons, silver buddies, and swim-

Largemouth are also being caught during the day on main channel brush and backs of creeks around laydowns using jigs, spoons, silver buddies, and A-rigs.

Stripers can be caught during the day on deep diving crankbaits and live bait on the main channel banks and points.

Walleye are being caught in the rivers and main channel flats on jigheads with a 3 inch grub and jerkbaits.

Crappie are being caught in creek pockets around cover using live minnows and jigs.

On May 1, 2019, the headwater elevation was at 721.49 ft. and the tailwater elevation was at 549.89 ft. Generation is scheduled from Midnight - Midnight (2 or more units). All 10 Spillway gates will be open until further notice. However, this is subject to change without notice or warning. The water temperature is 66 degrees.
